## (on back of bulletin) Paul Builds a Bridge

For eleven years, I was a pastor in Seattle, a city often hailed as our nation's "least religious". But this reputation hid a deeper, more compelling story. Many had left religion for good reasons.

Interestingly, the setting of Paul's speech on Mars Hill in Acts 17 became the namesake of two very different Seattle institutions – one a megachurch and one a school of theology and psychology. Both shared Paul's enthusiasm for witnessing to a culture that found Christianity strange. But it seemed as though the megachurch was inspired more by the god of Mars than by Paul, and zealously engaged the culture wars of the day. It later collapsed under the weight of its pastor's scandals and notorious bullying.

The school, by contrast, specializes in training counselors to care for survivors of trauma and abuse, and equips pastors to help their churches be places of healing, service, and transformation in their neighborhoods. It draws its inspiration from the way Paul's speech demonstrates both regard for and concern about the culture and people of Athens.

The verse on our bulletin cover (*In him we live and move and have our being*) actually comes from the Greek poet Aratus suggesting the radical notion that Zeus was not a mere sky king, managing the sun and moon and weather, but a force breathing life into all beings, sur-rounding us everywhere. Centuries later, Paul quotes Aratus and points to the next shift. It's as if he says: "Look, your own poets have seen it. God doesn't live in the shrines we make. God dwells within us! We are all God's children. God can overlook our confusion up until now, but eventually we'll be judged for how we treat our brothers and sisters. Worshiping temples is idolatry. Jesus Christ has made us the temple!"

Some scoffed, but others joined Paul and came to believe.

## What's Driving You?

Intro: Everyone is willing to witness to the reason for the kind of car they drive. And they are also usually ready to try to persuade others to come over to their side. But just like some of the dog walkers we see, we might ask ourselves 'Are you walking the dog or is the dog walking you'. Yes, you may be driving this outward expression of yourself, but do we know what drives us?

- B. Don't buy a Lemon -Out on Parole: 17:14-16
  - bad reception learn your lesson (17:5-6, 13, 18)
- C. Kelley Blue Book Mixed Reviews: 17:20, 32-34
  - Some positive, perhaps unexpectedly so 16:40, 17:4, 10-12, 34
- D. Drive a Jeep: Maintaining Openness
  - Curiosity driven 17:16, 23
  - Know your audience (v.17, v.18. v.21-22)
- E. Know what's under your Hood: 17:18 Good News
  - God is Lord –v.24
  - God waits for us –v.27
  - God has the highest standard v.30-31
  - God has raised Jesus from the dead v. 31

Conclusion: We need to recognize what drives us: is it fear, embarrassment, wanting to be accepted, needing to be right, and come with openness and receptivity to the Good News, and allow that to have Lordship in our lives, experiencing the all-encompassing love and longing God has for us, embracing the power of the resurrection in our living, and then allowing that to drive us.
